Investment review

Dear Investor

Welcome to the PUTM Bothwell North America annual report for 12 months, since 31 January 2022 to 31 January 2023. The assets from the PUTM Bothwell North America were transferred into the PUTM ACS North America Fund 2 on 2 December 2022. The Manager intends to wind up the PUTM Bothwell North America.

Performance Review

Over the review period the Bothwell North American Fund (passive) returned -0.82%. (Source: BNP IRP, Gross of AMC, GBP. This is compared to its benchmark index return of -0.82%. (Source: FTSE Custom AW Dev North America Index)

Investment review

Portfolio and Market Review

US equities, as measured by the S&P 500 Index, were down 1.5% in sterling terms and lower by 11.0% in US dollar terms following sharp declines in 2022 that were fuelled by anxiety about inflation and the economy. Hopes of an easing in monetary policy tightening and some solid corporate results helped the market regain some of the losses in the final months of the year. The annual inflation rate reached a more than 40-year high of 9.1% in June, although it declined thereafter, hitting a 14-month low of 6.5% in December. The US Federal Reserve (Fed) raised interest rates by 50bps to a 15-year high of 4.5% in December, which marked a slowdown from the four consecutive 75bps hikes implemented before. However, it warned that rates could stay higher for longer. The economy grew by an annualised 2.9% in the fourth quarter, after expanding 3.2% in the previous quarter. The US dollar strengthened, with the Fed's rate hikes helping it hit a more than 20-year high in September. The currency subsequently came under pressure on expectations that policy makers would turn less hawkish.

Market Outlook

The Fund closed in December 2022.

The investment objective and the investment policy detailed below, as well as the accounting policies on pages 16 and 17, were appropriate for the period when the Fund was open.

Investment objective

The Fund aimed to provide a total return (a combination of capital growth and income), delivering this return in line with the benchmark, before fees and expenses.

The benchmark is the FTSE North American Index (the "Index").

Investment policy

The Fund aimed to achieve this objective by investing over 90% of the portfolio in equities and equity related securities of companies that are constituents of the Index in approximate proportion to their weightings within the Index.

From time to time, the Fund may acquire or hold securities that are not constituents of the Index, as a result of corporate actions.

The Fund's holdings typically consisted of 'equity related securities' which include convertible stocks, stock exchange listed warrants, depositary receipts, and any other such investments which entitle the holder to subscribe for or convert into the equity of the company and/or where the share price performance is, in the opinion of the Investment Adviser, influenced significantly by the stock market performance of the company's ordinary shares. The Fund could also invest in other transferable securities, which were non-approved securities (essentially unlisted securities), money-market instruments, deposits, cash and near cash and other collective investment schemes.

Derivatives could be used for efficient portfolio management and hedging only.

Investment strategy

A minimum of 90% of the Fund was invested in components of the Index. The Fund would seek to physically replicate the Index. This process would involve investing in components of the Index, though not necessarily in the same proportions of the Index at all times. Consequently, the Fund could not track the Index exactly but would contain a meaningful exposure to the market. Stock Index Futures contracts could also be used to manage the cash portion of the Fund. It was intended that the Fund would normally close to fully invested as outlined above.

The Investment Advisor could use various Indexation or sampling techniques to achieve the objective of tracking the Index. In doing so the Investment Advisor could use discretion in deciding which investments were to be included in the portfolio. The number of investments so included could vary. The Investment Advisor at its discretion replace the current Index with such similar index as it may consider appropriate, subject to regulatory approval and appropriate notification to Unitholders.

Revenue distribution and pricing

Units of the Fund were available as Class 'A' Accumulation, 'B' Accumulation, 'C' Accumulation or 'D' Accumulation units (where revenue was reinvested to enhance the unit price). There could be two potential distributions in each accounting year: an interim distribution as at 31 July and a final distribution as at 31 January.

At each distribution the net revenue after deduction of expenses, from the investments of the Fund, was apportioned amongst the unitholders. Unitholders receive a tax voucher giving details of the distribution and the Manager's Report no later than two months after these dates.

Risk and reward profile

The Risk and Reward Indicator table demonstrates where the Fund ranks in terms of its potential risk and reward. The higher the rank the greater the potential reward but the greater the risk of losing money. It is based on past data, could change over time and could not be a reliable indication of the future risk profile of the Fund. The shaded area in the table below shows the Fund's ranking on the Risk and Reward Indicator.

Note 1 Accounting policies

(a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost basis, as modified by the revaluation of investments and in compliance with Financial Reporting Standard (FRS 102) and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice ('SORP') for Financial Statements of UK Authorised Funds issued by The Investment Association ('IA') in May 2014, and as amended in June 2017.

Following the decision of the Manager to wind up the Fund and approval from the FCA received on 10 October 2022, all of the units in the Fund were cancelled by in-specie transfer on 2 December 2022. Accordingly, the financial statements have been prepared on a break-up basis. No adjustments were required in these financial statements to reduce assets to their recoverable value or liabilities to their settlement

The Manager of the Fund will bear the costs relating to any such liabilities arising. Unless otherwise stated all accounting policies are consistent with those of the prior period

(b) Valuation of investments

All of the investments of the Fund were cancelled by in-specie transfer on 2 December 2022. Therefore, no investments were held at the end of the accounting year.

(c) Foreign exchange

Transactions in foreign currencies during the year were translated into Sterling (the functional currency of the Fund), at the rates of exchange ruling on the transaction date. Amounts held in foreign currencies have been translated at the rate of exchange ruling at close of business, 31 January 2023, the last valuation point in the accounting year.

(d) Revenue

Dividends receivable from equity investments and distributions receivable from collective investment schemes were credited to revenue when they are first quoted ex-dividend. Interest receivable on bank deposits is accounted for on a receipts basis and money market funds is accounted for on an accruals basis.

Any commission arising from stocklending was recognised on an accruals basis and is disclosed net of fees.

Dividends received from US REITs are allocated between revenue and capital for distribution purposes. The split is based on the year end tax reporting data issued by the US REIT available on the website www.REIT.com.

Where the split of revenue and capital has not been announced at the accounting date a provisional split will be used.

The provision will be calculated on the prior year's aggregated dividend split for each US REIT.

(e) Special dividends

Special dividends were treated either as revenue or repayments of capital depending on the facts of each particular case. It is likely that where the receipt of a special dividend results in a significant reduction in the capital value of the holding, then the special dividend should be treated as capital in nature so as to ensure the matching principle is applied to gains and losses. Otherwise, the special dividend should be treated as revenue.

(f) Stock dividends

The ordinary element of stocks received in lieu of cash was recognised as revenue. Any excess in value of shares received over the amount of cash forgone would be treated as capital.

Note 1 Accounting policies (continued)

(g) Expenses

Expenses were accounted for on an accruals basis. Expenses of the Fund were charged against revenue, except for the safe custody charge and costs associated with the purchase and sale of investments, which are charged to capital.

(h) Taxation

The charge for taxation is based on taxable income for the year less allowable expenses. UK dividends and franked distributions from UK collective investment schemes are disclosed net of any related tax credit.

Overseas dividends, unfranked distributions from UK collective investment schemes, and distributions from overseas collective investment schemes are disclosed gross of any tax suffered, the tax element being separately disclosed in the taxation note.

(i) Deferred taxation

Deferred tax is provided at current rates of corporation tax on all timing differences which have originated but not reversed by the Balance sheet date. Deferred tax is not recognised on permanent differences.

Deferred tax assets are recognised only to the extent that the Manager considers it is more likely than not that there will be taxable profits from which underlying timing differences can be deducted.

Note 2 Distribution policies

(a) Basis of distribution

Revenue produced by the Fund's investments accumulates during each accounting period. If, at the end of each accounting period, revenue exceeds expenses, the net revenue of the Fund is available to be distributed/accumulated to unitholders. Prior to closure, the Fund was not more than 60% invested in qualifying investments (as defined by SI 2006/964. Reg 20) and will pay a dividend distribution.

(b) Unclaimed distributions

Distributions remaining unclaimed after six years were paid into the Fund as part of the capital property.

(c) Apportionment to multiple unit classes

With the exception of the Manager's periodic charge, the allocation of revenue and expenses to each unit class was based upon the proportion of the Fund's assets attributable to each unit class on the day the revenue was earned or the expense is suffered. The Manager's periodic charge was specific to each unit class. Tax will be allocated between the unit classes according to income. Consequently, the revenue available to distribute for each unit class could differ.

(d) Stock dividends

It was the policy of the Fund, where applicable, to distribute the revenue element of stock dividends.

(e) Special dividends

It was the policy of the Fund, where applicable, to distribute special dividends which have been treated as revenue.

(f) Expenses

In determining the net revenue available for distribution, charges in relation to the safe custody of investments were ultimately borne by capital.

Note 3 Risk management policies

The risks arising from the Fund's financial instruments were market price risk, interest rate risk, foreign currency risk, liquidity risk and counterparty risk. The Manager's policies for managing these risks are summarised below and have been applied throughout the year.

(a) Market price risk

Market price risk arises mainly from uncertainty about future prices of financial instruments held. It represents the potential loss the Fund might suffer through holding market positions in the face of price movements. The Fund's investment portfolio was exposed to market fluctuations which were monitored by the Manager in pursuit of the investment objectives and policies. Adherence to investment guidelines and to investment and borrowing powers set out in the Trust Deed, the Prospectus and in the Collective Investment Schemes Sourcebook ("the Sourcebook") mitigates the risk of excessive exposure to any particular type of security or issuer.

(b) Interest rate risk

The majority of the Fund's financial assets were equity shares and other investments which neither pay interest nor have a maturity date. Interest receivable on bank deposits or payable on bank overdraft positions will be affected by fluctuations in interest rates.

(c) Foreign currency risk

All of the Fund's investment portfolio was invested in overseas securities and the Balance sheet could be (significantly) affected by movements in foreign exchange rates. The Fund might have been be subject to short term exposure to exchange rate movements between placing the purchase or sale of securities and agreeing a related currency transaction albeit usually the two transactions were agreed at the same time.

Any such currency transactions must be used in accordance with the investment objective of the Fund and must be deemed by the Investment Manager to be economically appropriate. Regular production of portfolio risk reports highlight concentrations of risk, including currency risk, for the Fund.

(d) Liquidity risk

The Fund's assets were comprised of mainly readily realisable securities. If insufficient cash were available to finance unit holder redemptions then securities held by the Fund may need to be sold. The risk of low market liquidity, through reduced trading volumes, might have been affected the ability of the Fund to trade financial instruments at values previously indicated by financial brokers. From time to time, liquidity might also be affected by stock specific or economic events. To manage these risks the Manager performs market research in order to achieve the best price for any transactions entered into on behalf of the Fund. All stocks are valued daily but those stocks identified as being less liquid are reviewed on a regular basis for pricing accuracy.

(e) Counterparty risk

Certain transactions in securities that the Fund enters into expose it to the risk that the counterparty will not deliver the investment (purchase) or cash (sale) after the Fund has fulfilled its responsibilities. The Fund only buys and sells investments through brokers which have been approved by the Manager as an acceptable counterparty. This list is reviewed annually.

Note 3 Risk management policies (continued)

(f) Derivatives

Not

Derivative transactions may be used by the Fund for the purposes of meeting its investment objectives and also for hedging. In doing so the Manager may make use of a variety of derivative instruments in accordance with the Sourcebook. The use of derivatives for investment purposes means that the net asset value of the Fund may at times have high volatility, although derivatives will not be used with the intention of raising the risk profile of the Fund. Where derivatives are used for hedging this will not compromise the risk profile of the Fund. Use of derivatives will not knowingly contravene any relevant investment objective or limits.

There were no derivatives held at the year end.

Equalisation

- · select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- make judgements and estimates that are prudent and reasonable;
- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed subject to any material departure disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Fund will continue in operation. For reasons stated in the Manager's report and Note 1(a), the financial statements have been prepared on a break up basis as the Fund is not a going concern.

The Manager is also required to manage the Fund in accordance with the Trust Deed, the Prospectus and the Sourcebook, maintain proper financial records to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Statement of Recommended Practice for Authorised Funds as issued by the IA in May 2014 (amended June 2017) and the Sourcebook and take reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

b) The Depositary in its capacity as Trustee of the PUTM Bothwell North America Fund must ensure that the Trust is managed in accordance with the Financial Conduct Authority's Collective Investment Schemes Sourcebook, the Financial Services and Markets Act 2000, as amended, (together 'the Regulations'), the Trust Deed and Prospectus (together 'the Scheme documents') as detailed below.

The Depositary must in the context of its role act honestly, fairly, professionally, independently and in the interests of the Trust and its investors.

The Depositary is responsible for the safekeeping of all custodial assets and maintaining a record of all other assets of the Trust in accordance with the Regulations.

The Depositary must ensure that:

- the Trust's cash flows are properly monitored and that cash of the Trust is booked in cash accounts in accordance with the Regulations;
- the sale, issue, repurchase, redemption and cancellation of units are carried out in accordance with the Regulations;
- the value of units of the Trust are calculated in accordance with the Regulations;
- any consideration relating to transactions in the Trust's assets is remitted to the Trust within the usual time limits:
- · the Trust's income is applied in accordance with the Regulations; and
- the instructions of the Authorised Fund Manager ("the AFM"), which is the UCITS Management Company, are carried out (unless they conflict with the Regulations).

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Emphasis of matter - financial statements prepared on a break up basis

We draw attention to Note 1(a) to the financial statements which explains that the Manager intends to wind up the Fund and therefore does not consider it to be appropriate to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements. Accordingly, the financial statements have been prepared on a break up basis as described in Note 1(a). Our opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

Other information

The other information comprises the information included in the Annual Report other than the financial statements and our auditor's report thereon. The Manager is responsible for the other information contained within the Annual Report.

Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and, except to the extent otherwise explicitly stated in this report, we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

Our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or our knowledge obtained in the audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If we identify such material inconsistencies or apparent material misstatements, we are required to determine whether this gives rise to a material misstatement in the financial statements themselves. If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of the other information, we are required to report that fact.

 propensity to influence revenue and amounts available for distribution. We identified a fraud risk with
 respect to the incomplete or inaccurate income recognition through incorrect classification of special
 dividends and the resulting impact to amounts available for distribution. We tested appropriateness of
 management's classification of material special dividends as either a capital or revenue return.
- Based on this understanding we designed our audit procedures to identify non-compliance with such laws and regulations. Our procedures involved review of the reporting to the Manager with respect to the application of the documented policies and procedures and review of the financial statements to test compliance with the reporting requirements of the Fund.
- Due to the regulated nature of the Fund, the Statutory Auditor considered the experience and expertise of the engagement team to ensure that the team had the appropriate competence and capabilities to identify non-compliance with the applicable laws and regulations.

Assessment of Value

We are required to perform an annual assessment of the value for money for each unit class of PUTM Bothwell North America Fund. This has been performed based on the information available as at 31 January 2023.

We have performed this review having regard to a wide range of factors. In doing so, we have made comparison with the other unit classes of the relevant fund, with the unit classes and sub-funds within our fund ranges and also with comparable unit classes and sub-funds in the rest of the market.

Broadly speaking, assessment of value requires consideration of a combination of factors, including the return achieved, the price paid, the risk taken and the quality and range of services provided by the asset manager. This also needs to be considered in the context of the investment objectives and policy for the Fund, the target investor and the recommended holding period.

In considering cost, regard needs to be had to the total cost of investing, including any adviser charges, platform charges, adviser fees and the on-going annual management charge. Regard also needs to be had to the degree of active management; as an investor, you would not be receiving value, if you were being charged fees for active portfolio management, where in fact, the Fund's composition of performance is staying very close to a benchmark. These factors also need to be considered in the context of the size of the portfolio and the ability of larger funds to benefit from economies of scale. As regards performance, it is important that performance is considered over an appropriate timescale given the Fund's objectives, and should be measured net of fees.

Based on our assessment of the value of each unit class, PUTM can confirm that the Fund meets all of the required Assessment of Value criteria. No immediate action is required.
